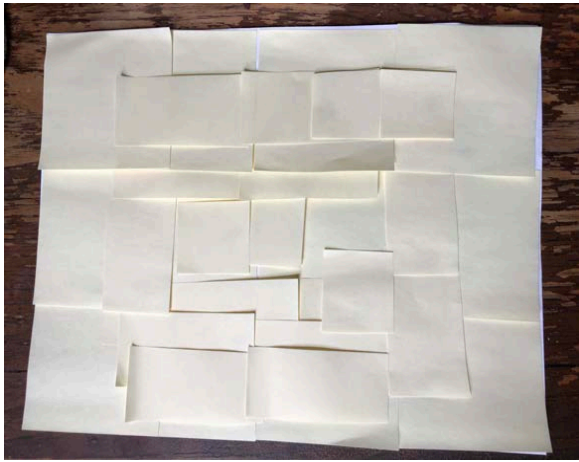

Instructions

Step 1: Cubism in art expresses something that is based in reality while using geometric shapes to illustrate it. What is your favorite shape?

Step 2: Explore your house. Look for materials that you can use to create your artwork. Think about the colors and shape of the materials you collect. Think about a geometric shape you want to incorporate into your artwork. What materials replicate that shape? Make sure you ask a parent or guardian's permission to use the materials that you find.

Step 3: Once you have collected materials for your artwork find a place to set up your assemblage. You can create your artwork on a piece of paper, on the floor, or on a table.

Step 4: Think about how you want to arrange the materials to illustrate your subject. What are the colors and shapes of the materials that you have collected? How can you use these characteristics to re-create the shape that you have chosen?

Step 5 (Optional): Take a picture of your artwork and share with your friends and family.

Vocabulary

Found object — a thing that someone else has given or thrown away that is often repurposed by artists

Cubism is a movement in art that began in France in 1907 that is characterized by the use of geometric planes and shapes.
