

Movement Mondays: Complementary Color Scavenger Hunt




Explore your house to collect objects to make artwork that uses complementary colors.

Complementary colors get their name because they compliment each other. Using complementary colors in your artwork naturally makes it more pleasing to look at.

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Instructions

Step 1: What is your favorite color? Look up your favorite color on the color wheel. What color is directly across from it? That color is its **complementary color**. For example: the complementary color of purple is yellow and vice versa.

Step 2: Search your house for objects that are the two complementary colors you chose in step **1.** Make sure you ask a parent or guardian's permission to use the objects that you find.

Step 3: Once you have collected objects for your artwork find a place to set up. You can create your artwork on a piece of paper, on the floor, or on a table.

Step 4: Think about how you want to arrange the objects to utilize the characteristics of complementary colors. Create a **pattern** by arranging the complementary colors one after another and **repeat** this arrangement.

Step 5 (Optional): Take pictures of your artwork and share them with your friends and family.

Vocabulary

Found object — a thing that someone else has given or thrown away that is often repurposed by artists

Complementary colors – colors that are opposite each other on a color wheel

Pattern – a repetition of specific visual elements in art

Repetition - the use of two or more similar elements within a composition. The arrangement of a repeated shape or form creates a pattern.
